It is anticipated that, after taking this course, students should be able to: 1) describe the main contemporary political sociology theories; 2) to think critically about social and political developments; and 3) to use social theory to examine political processes.

Prerequisites for entering the course

Before entering the course, students are expected to know basics of sociology, classical and contemporary sociological theories and social research methods.
